

Fund performance summary

The S&P/ASX Small Ordinaries Accumulation Index returned +10.27% for the month. The fund underperformed the market and delivered a +6.17% return over the month.

Market overview

The S&P/ASX Small Ordinaries Index (XSO) increased by a substantial 10.3% during November 2020. The Small Industrials increased by 10.1%, while the Small Resources decreased by 10.9%. XSO finished the month on a forecast FY22 price to earnings ratio of 20.1x which is 26% above its 5-year average. This valuation is an in line equivalent ratio for the ASX200.

The best performing sectors were: Metals & Mining - Other, (+40.6%), Media (+26.0%), Consumer Discretionary & Leisure (+23.4%), Engineering & Mining Services (+23.4%) and Banks (22.6%). The worst performing sectors during November were Metals & Mining - Precious (-8.0%), Automotive (-1%), Retail (-0.3%) and Whole Distribution & Manufacturing (+3.8%).

The best performing stocks within the XSO Index were Unibail-Rodamco (URW, +73%), Pilbara Minerals (PLS, +69%), Webjet (WEB, +65%) and Orocobre (ORE, +61%). Orocobre and Pilbara are all exposed to battery materials for electric vehicles. The sales of electric vehicles have been strong in China and Europe despite the COVID downturn. Unibail bounced on the expectation that vaccines would have a significant impact on shopping centres.

The worst performing stocks in the XSO index were Kogan (KGN, -20%), Alkane (ALK, -18%) and Silver Lake Resources (SLR, -16%). Kogan declined after passing a heavily criticised executive remuneration package at its AGM.

Market outlook

The market and economic outlook are dominated by the rate of recovery from COVID-19. The economic damage measured by rises in unemployment is likely to be significant in a historical context. However, the depth of this impact and whether the recovery is steep or slow or in fact W shaped will keep markets guessing for the near future. The acceleration or re-emergence of COVID cases in many places is now a concern with lockdowns across Europe. We believe whatever the shape of the downturn and recovery that interest rates will remain low and debt will remain very high.

The ongoing trade dispute between The US and China has become more pronounced during the COVID-19 lockdown period. The election of Joe Biden as the new US President has led to a pause while markets wait to see what path the new administration in The US will take on the China trade dispute. Australia is caught up in this dispute with several exports targeted. Despite this commodity prices are rising.

Resources and their related mining services suppliers are also dependent on the US\$/A\$ exchange rate. The A\$ is currently trading at around US\$0.74c. The A\$ has strengthened as optimism on world growth in 2021 has improved. At this stage commodity prices are increasing at a faster rate than the A\$. The farming community also looks set to significantly benefit from record crops across Australia following best in a decade condition. The biggest concern at present seems to be finding enough people to pick the crops given COVID restrictions.
